

Martin Luther King To Stir Civil Ideas On Drew Campus



MADISON - Time Magazine's "Man Of the Year", Martin Luther King Jr., will be presented by Drew University in a public lecture next Wednesday evening, February 5, at 8 o'clock. Baldwin Gymnasium, the largest meeting hall on campus, has been selected as the best place to accommodate the expected crowd of listeners.

At press time, the University did not know what his specific topic would be but it is assumed that it will consider some phase of the civil rights movement, for which Dr. King has become a living sym-

bol. The group of pictures above show the Negro leader in action. At upper left he receives the first album of his speech delivered during the mammoth Detroit rally last June. Time selected Dr. King "as a man - but also as a representative of his people." The criterion for selection is the individual "who dominated the news of that year and left an indelible mark - for good or ill - on history." One of Time's writers gives this impression of Dr. King: "a man always on the go, with only a few hours' sleep, and with the facility of always speaking grammatically, cohesively, and even eloquently, whether sitting in an airport lobby, eating a salad at his desk or riding in a car."
