NELLE K. MORTON

Born in Sullivan County, Tennessee, Nelle Morton is a graduate of Flora Macdonald College (B.A.) and New York Theological Seminary (M.R.E.). She has also studied at the Presbyterian School of Christian Education, the University of Geneva, Switzerland, the Graduate Ecumenical Institute in Celigny, Switzerland, and L'Institut de Rosseau, Geneva. St. Andrews Presbyterian College honored her with a Doctor of Humane Letters degree in 1979.

Nelle Morton joined the faculty of the Theological School at Drew in 1956, in the field of Christian Education, following the retirement of Mildred Moody Eakin, continuing at Drew until 1971 when she retired as Associate Professor of Christian Education, emerita. Prior to coming to Drew, Professor Morton served as Director of Christian Education in several local churches, on the youth ministry staff of the Presbyterian Church, U.S., and as Executive Secretary for the Fellowship of Southern Churchmen.

Over the years, she has lectured and offered occasional courses at a number of colleges, theological schools, and universities, including, Union Theological Seminary, Andover Newton Theological School, Perkins School of Theology, and Pacific School of Religion. Europe, as well as America, has been a field of her endeavors. In 1965, Professor Morton attended a conference in East Berlin on "Marxist-Christian Dialogue", was the plenary speaker at the World Council of Churches' conference on "Sexism in the Sixties" in 1974, and gave the plenary address at the World Federation of Methodist Women in Dublin, Ireland in 1976.

Professor Morton has authored several books, including *The Bible and Its Use, The Church We Cannot see,* and *The Biblical Faith and Your Campus in Dialogue,* as well as contributions to a number of religious journals and anthologies. Her lectures, research, and writing have increasingly dealt with feminist issues and implications for personal and social change. She is currently working on a book on woman, language, and theology growing out of her research as a Fellow in the Institute of Policy Studies in Washington, D.C. In her teaching, Professor Morton pioneered in raising "The Woman Question" in the context of theological inquiry and education, and many women scholars, theologians, and pastors see in her not only a sister, but a foremother as well.

BEVERLY WILDUNG HARRISON

Beverly Wildung Harrison is a graduate of Macalester College (B.A., 1954) and Union Theological Seminary, New York (M.R.E., 1956; Ph.D., 1975). She joined the faculty of Union Theological Seminary in 1964 and has been professor or Christian Ethics since 1979. Prior to her appointment at Union Theological Seminary, Dr. Harrison served as Associate Presbyterian University Pastor, University of California at Berkeley, and as the Associate for International Seminars, United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. She has taught at various times at San Francisco Seminary, Graduate Theological Union, Iliff School of Theology, and Drew.

Dr. Harrison has published numerous essays and articles concerning sexism and religion, human sexuality, ethics and energy, aging, social justice and ministry, and liberation theology in the Americas. She is the author of *Our Right to Choose: Towards a New Ethic of Abortion* (Beacon Press) and has a forthcoming book entitled: *Essays in Feminist Social Ethics*, edited by Carol Robb.

Active in many committees and societies, Dr. Harrison was president of the American Society of Christian Ethics in 1982, is a founding member of the Feminist Theological Institute, and plays a major role in Feminist Scholars in Religion.
